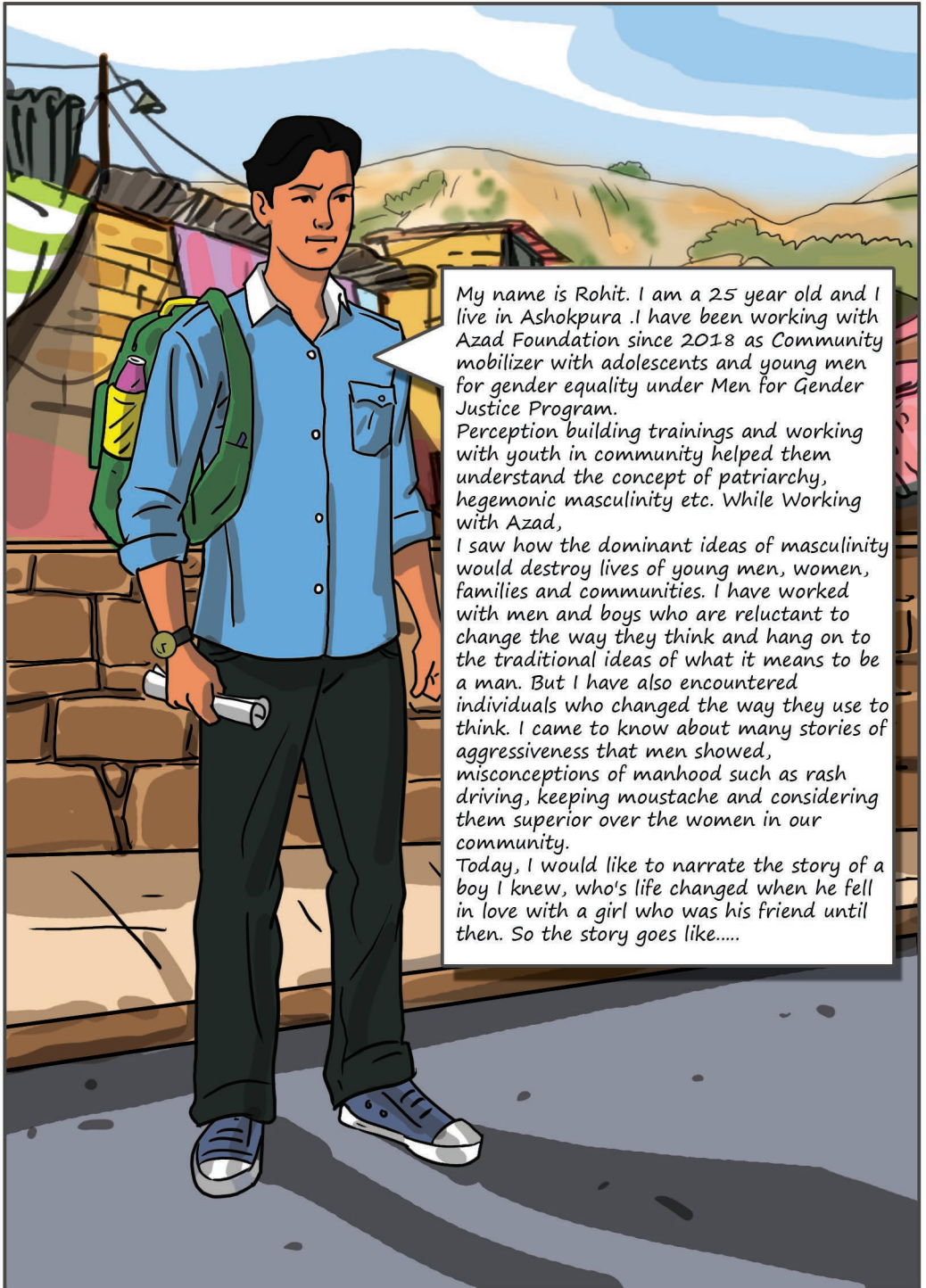

Hegemonic masculinity



My name is Rohit. I am a 25 year old and I live in Ashokpura .I have been working with Azad Foundation since 2018 as Community mobilizer with adolescents and young men for gender equality under Men for Gender Justice Program.

Perception building trainings and working with youth in community helped them understand the concept of patriarchy, hegemonic masculinity etc. While Working with Azad,

I saw how the dominant ideas of masculinity would destroy lives of young men, women, families and communities. I have worked with men and boys who are reluctant to change the way they think and hang on to the traditional ideas of what it means to be a man. But I have also encountered individuals who changed the way they use to think. I came to know about many stories of aggressiveness that men showed, misconceptions of manhood such as rash driving, keeping moustache and considering them superior over the women in our community.

Today, I would like to narrate the story of a boy I knew, who's life changed when he fell in love with a girl who was his friend until then. So the story goes like.....

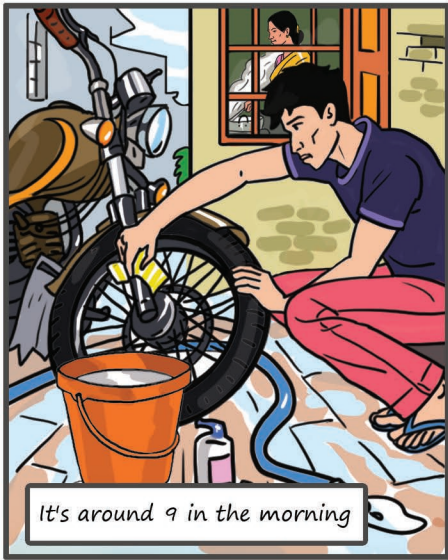

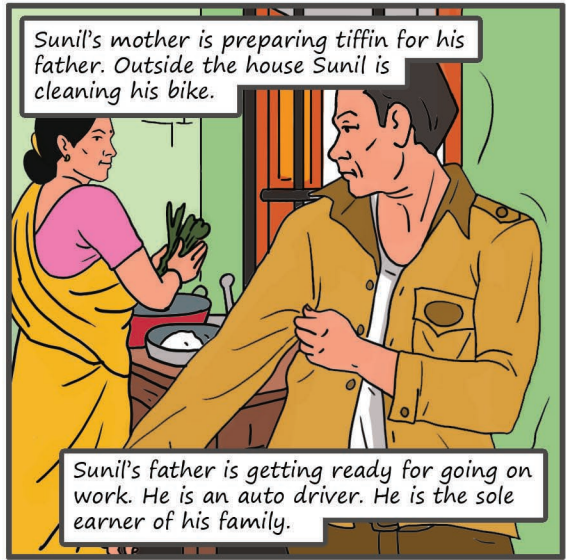

The story 'Choice of manhood' is about an incident that happened in Jhallana area between a girl and boy. They are neighbors and study in the same college. Sunil develops a liking for his friend Sujata, but Sujata doesn't seem to have the same feelings for Sunil.

How does Sunil navigate this apparent rejection? What advices from his peer group guide his actions? This story will explore how the ideas of what it means to be a real man effects the lives of men and the people around them.

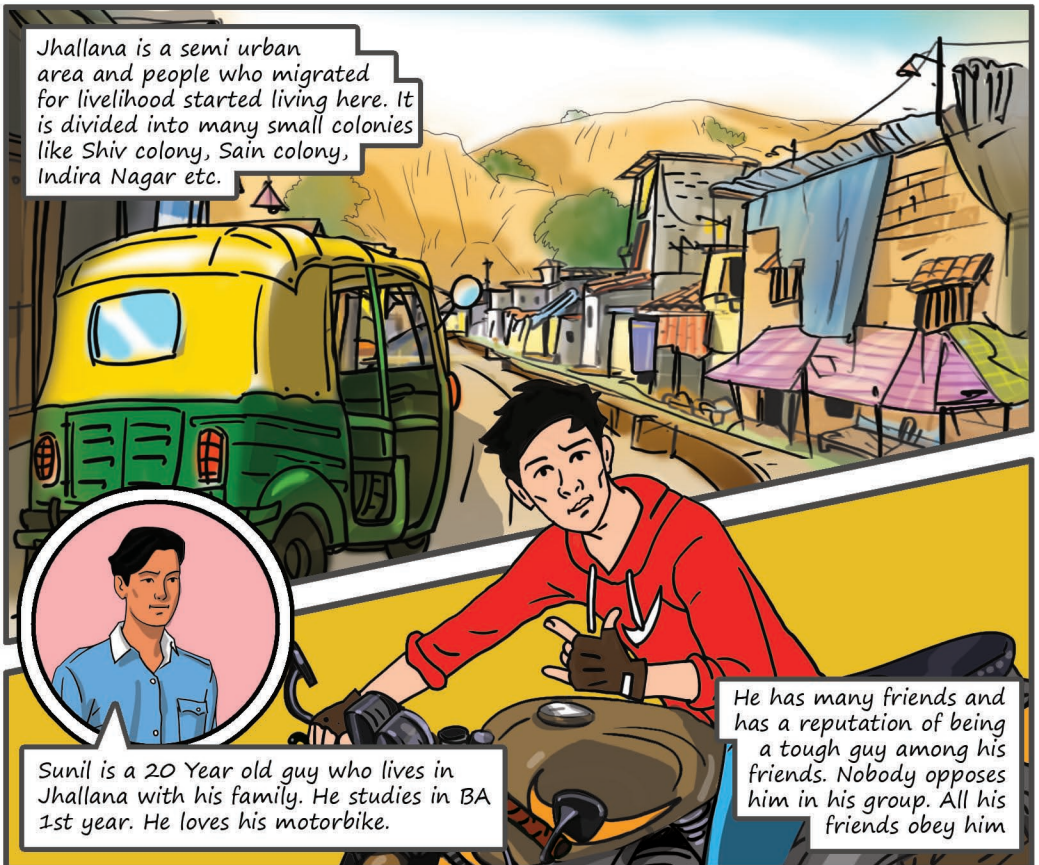


It's around 9 in the morning



Sunil's mother is preparing tiffin for his father. Outside the house Sunil is cleaning his bike.

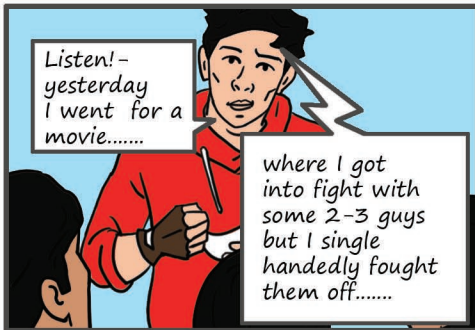
Sunil's father is getting ready for going on work. He is an auto driver. He is the sole earner of his family.

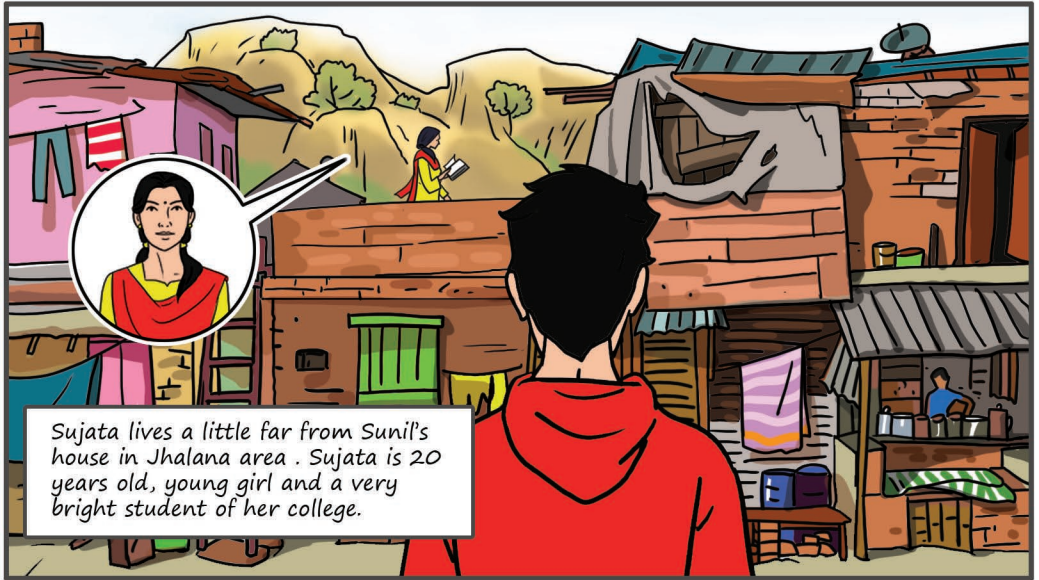

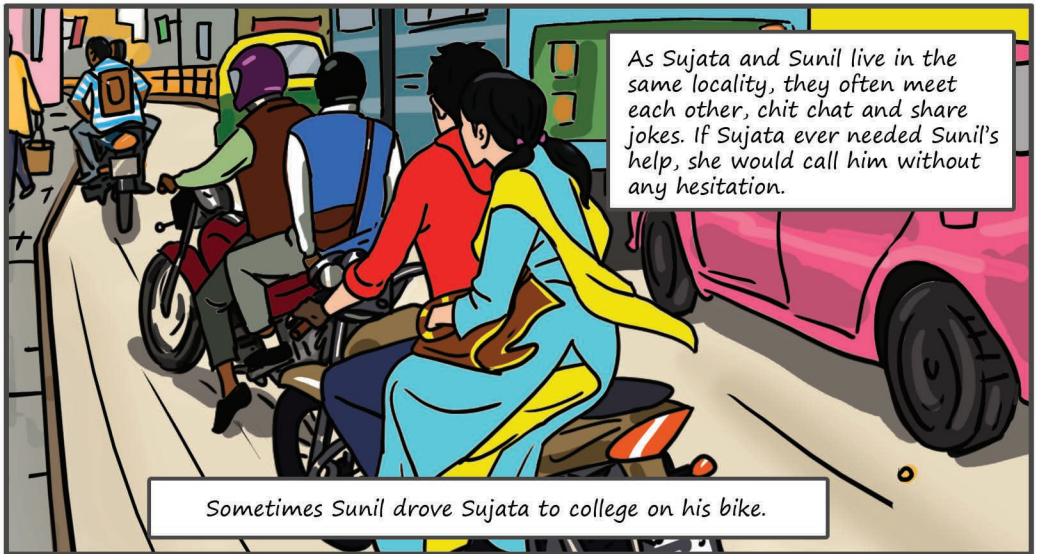
Sunil is a 20 Year old guy who lives in Jhallana with his family. He studies in BA 1st year. He loves his motorbike.

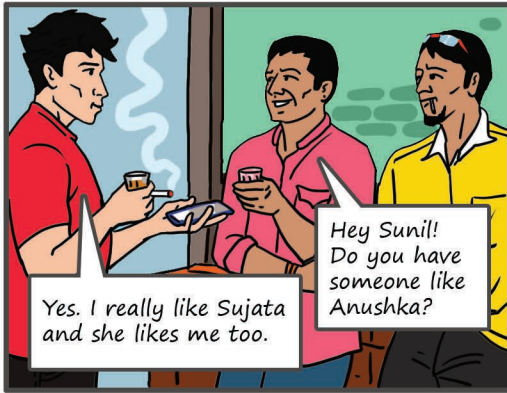
Sometimes Sunil drove Sujata to college on his bike.

....both often used to chat on WhatsApp

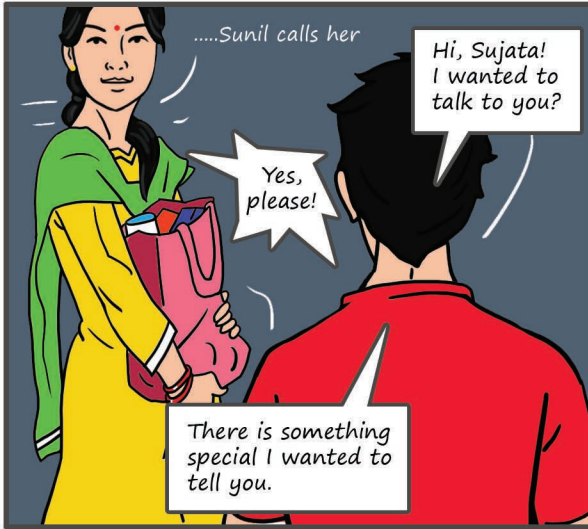




Sunil is standing at the grocery shop with his friends and Sujata comes to shop.....



while she was returning back home after buying groceries...

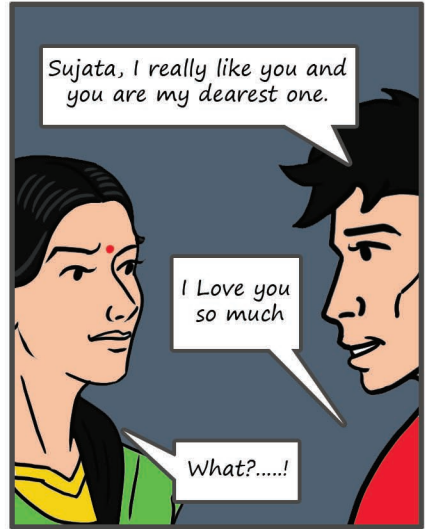


....Sunil calls her

Yes, please!

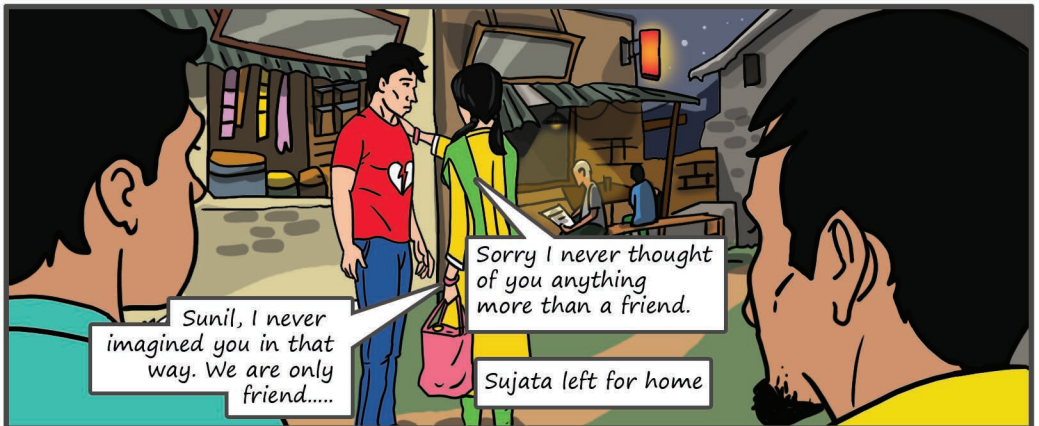
There is something special I wanted to tell you.

How can Sujata say No like that!



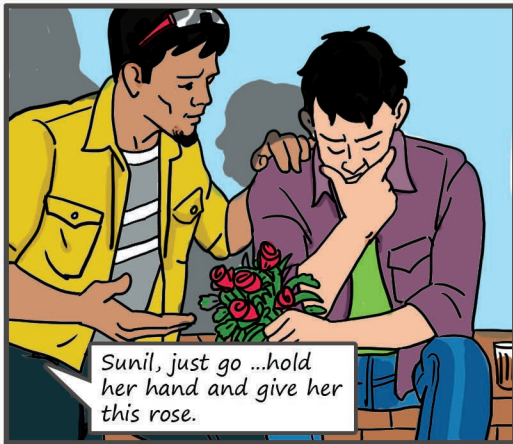
what happened? Why are you not answering our call



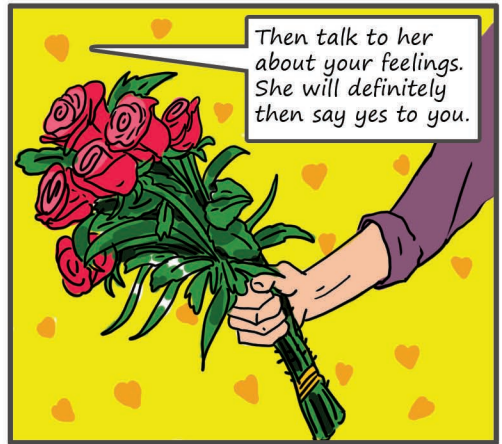
Hey don't think of your current situation with Sujata so much. She must have said no just like that. Girls' no is a yes, you know.

Yes, he is right, I think you should propose her once again. I know these girls very well.. surely she will be with you !

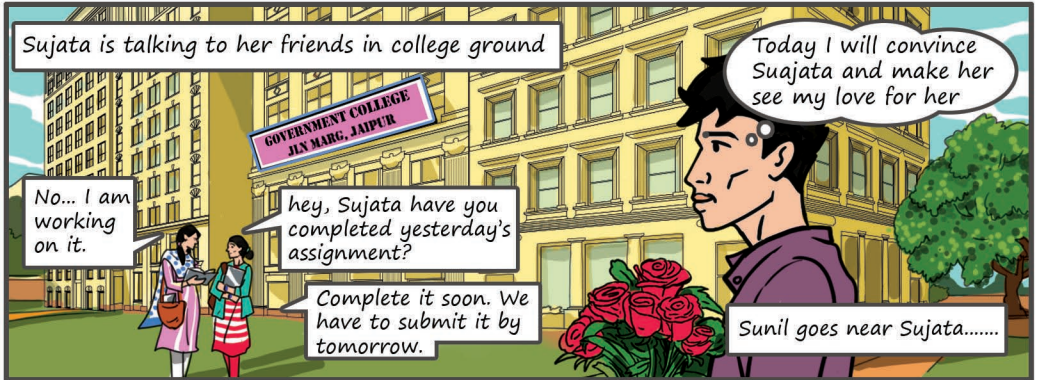
Sunil is convinced with his friend's idea and he decides to propose Sujata soon

Sujata is talking to her friends in college ground

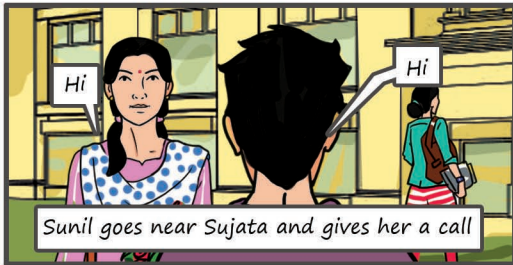
Today I will convince Sujata and make her see my love for her

Sunil goes near Sujata and gives her a call

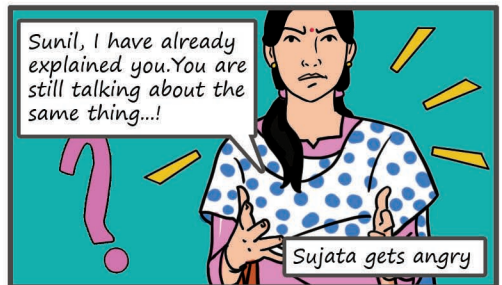


Sujata I haven't been able to sleep since that day.....



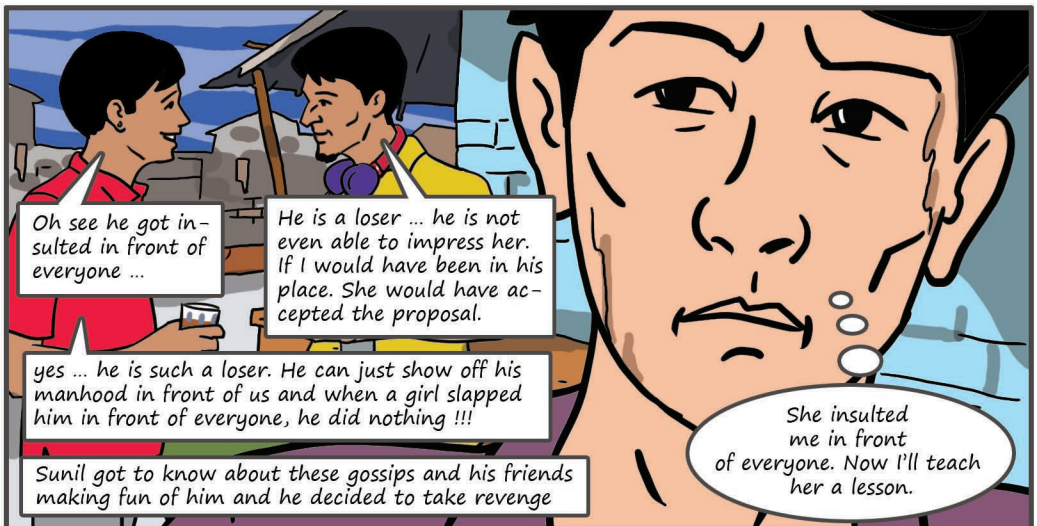
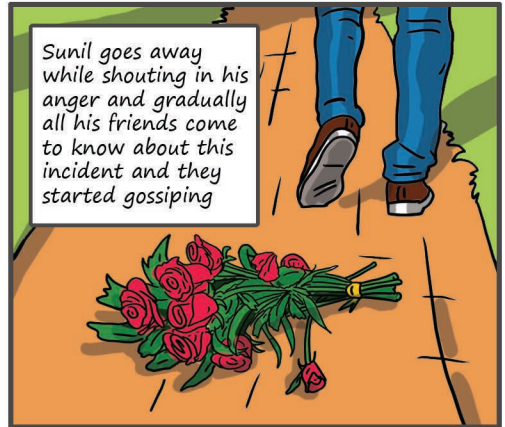
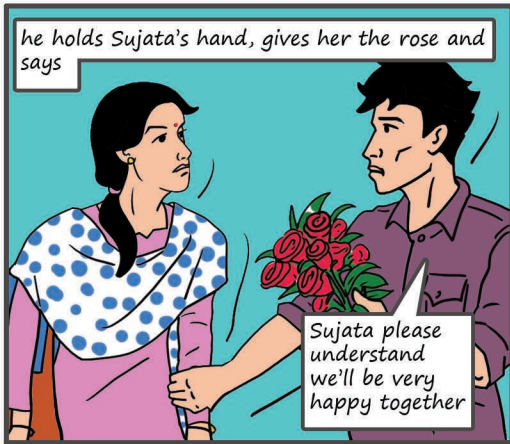

Sujata gets angry





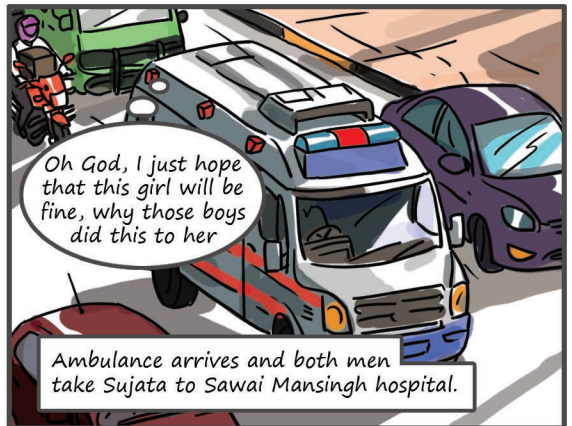
Sujata leaving for her college, waiting at the bus stand in a queue .



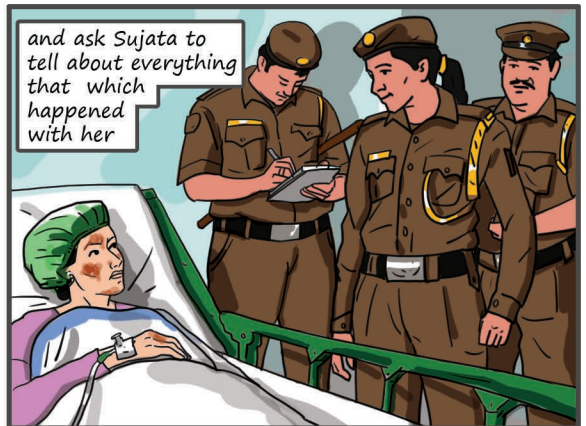
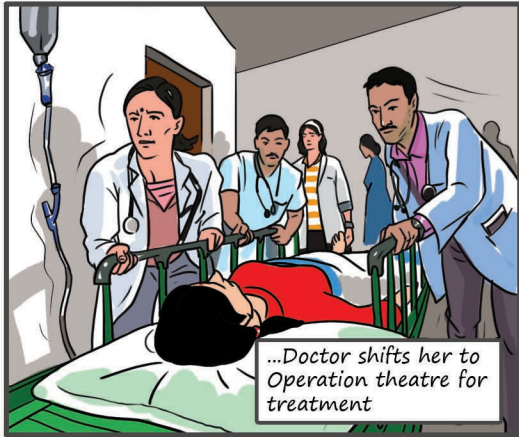
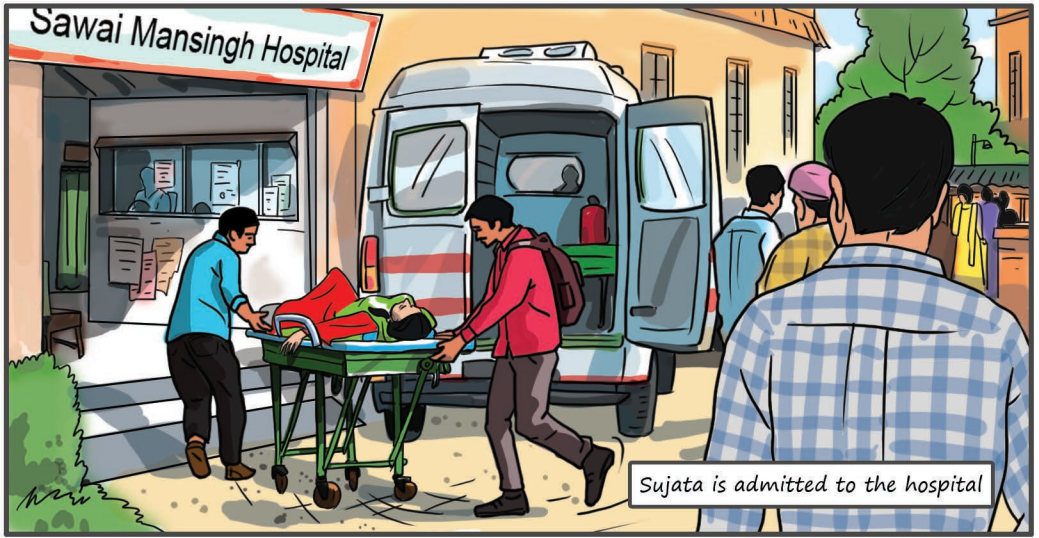
Sunil arrives at the bus stand - throws acid on her, and flee.... !

Ambulance arrives and both men take Sujata to Sawai Mansingh hospital.





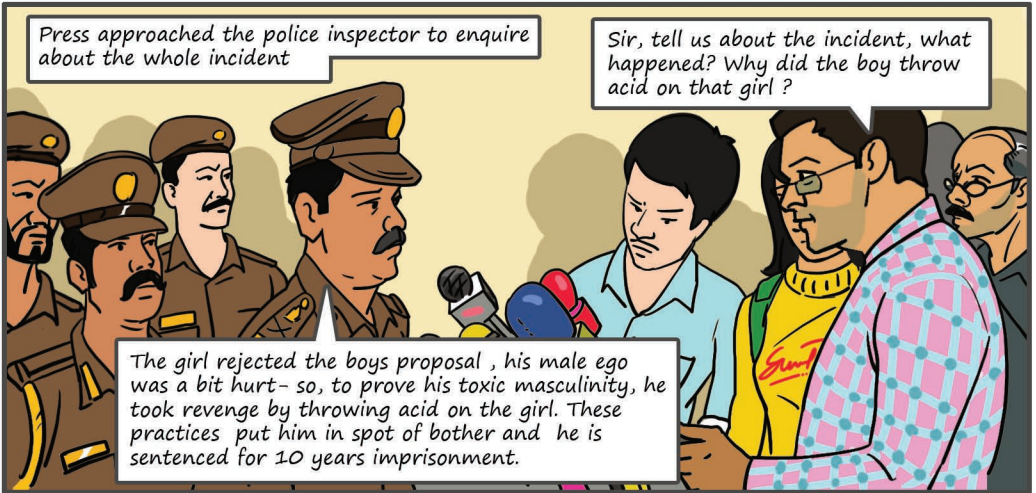
Due to fear , Sunil was hiding from the police in his friend's house...

Sir, tell us about the incident, what happened? Why did the boy throw acid on that girl ?

The girl rejected the boys proposal , his male ego was a bit hurt- so, to prove his toxic masculinity, he took revenge by throwing acid on the girl. These practices put him in spot of bother and he is sentenced for 10 years imprisonment.



It was so unfortunate ! Sunil took such a big step, for such a small matter

It takes years to earn respect and Sunil Spoiled his whole life and also his parents are not able to face anyone and lost the respect


People in the community are talking about the incident.



Is there anything that we haven't done for my child? I never thought that a day would come when we would not be able to show our faces to anyone.

One year later

Sunil is sitting in the jail and he is thinking about the past events and feeling guilty for his act



My aggression and wrong sense of manhood has got me here. I have ruined the life of my parents and because of me they have to listen to the comments of people. I should have respectfully accepted the decision of Sujata instead of committing this crime.



Sujata has recovered and happily living her life

After few days Sujata overcame this trauma and she continues with her further studies . She is now a graduate working for a bank as an executive, happily living her life .

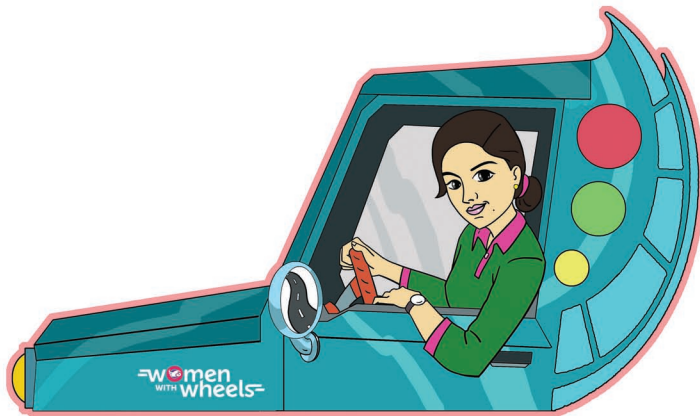
Debriefing note:

There are various socially constructed definitions of what it means to be a man, and these definitions change over time and from place to place. 'Masculinities' is used to describe these various social constructs of what it means to be a man. Generally, most of these notions promote, reward and encourage men for being aggressive, controlling over women, taking unnecessary risks and a host of other unhealthy behaviors. Such notions mean that men grow up feeling entitled to being served and obeyed. While this may not seem like something that should worry men, but Sunil's story is an example of how it can destroy the lives of men and the people around them. Notions of masculinities are often created by films and popular culture. We grow up listening to music, films and learn a lot from them. Unfortunately, many of the toxic definitions of being a man are also something we internalize from the movies we watch and the content we consume over years. Imagine if movies did not glorify stalking as true love, don't you think Sunil could have acted differently? It is surprisingly common, that most of the actions, interests and inclinations of adolescent boys are shaped by their understanding of what it means to be a man. Young boys grow up wanting to leave an impression of being intimidating and powerful. Showing weakness, being vulnerable or being kind are not seen as the traits of a man.

There are a lot of lessons that we can learn from Sunil's story. Sunil tries to earn the respect of his friends by appearing intimidating. He treats them like trash and smokes cigarettes to look cool in front of them. Sunil's ego is hurt when he gets to know that Sujata doesn't love him back. Sunil cannot handle rejection and he resorts to violence to take revenge. All this while, his friends enable his behavior. From Sunil's story, we can learn that the ability to accept and move on from rejection is a quality that good men should have. Sunil feels hurt by Sujata's rejection and makes her uncomfortable by proposing to her multiple times.

We should respect the decisions and choices of women and girls. It is a common myth that a girl's no means yes (ladki ki naa main haanhotihai). Well, it's time to dump that, and all other regressive thoughts along with it. This is an example of stalking and harassment, and not 'true love' as many movies may portray it to be. Being a good man is therefore about being kind to others. It is about respecting the decisions and choices of women. A good man should use his courage to stand up and confront people like Sunil instead of enabling their behavior. A good man should be comfortable talking about their problems and seeking help from people, rather than always trying to appear strong and intimidating. Take a moment and reflect on how you would do things differently than Sunil or his friends if you were in their place?

Young men receive many harmful, sometimes contradictory messages on what it means to "be a man." If young men don't conform to these messages of masculinity, that does not mean they are "less than" or not good enough. Young men can and should work to redefine more positive and more inclusive forms of masculinity. Hegemonic and Toxic masculinity is not just a men's issue, its consequences are pervasive and affect everyone, including girls and women. Boys and men should make choices about their behavior that can either perpetuate a culture of toxic masculinity or disrupt it.

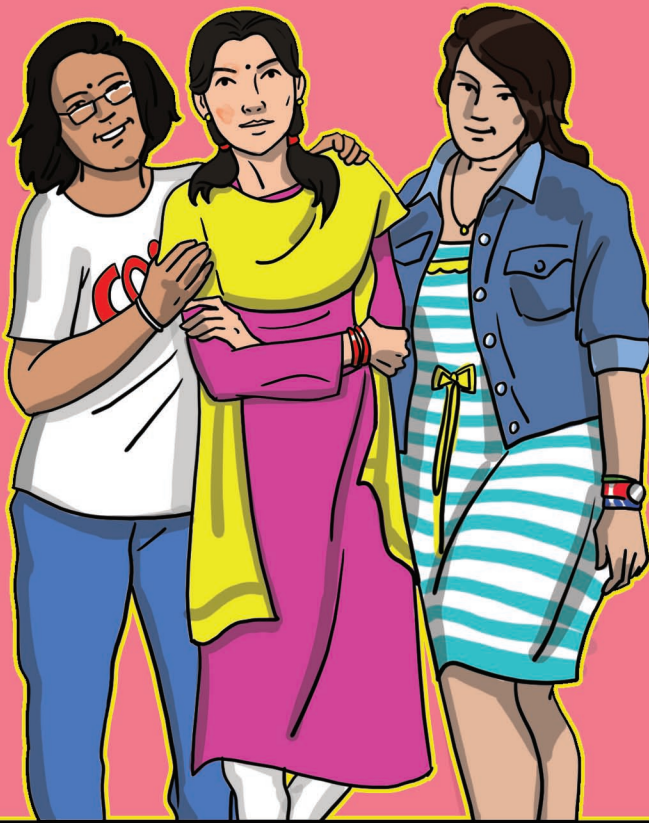
