



PARTIE ...

Unpaid care work





Read on to know what happens in the story...
















































That sounds reassuring. I will try to do this today.

















































Debriefing note:

To reflect on the story, we need to have a proper understanding about unpaid care work in domestic spaces. It's can be explained as any work that involves looking after a sick patient, raising a child, talking to someone in emotional distress and a lot of other activities. Domestic work includes all work that has to be done to maintain a home and raise a family.

Care work and domestic work are often seen as the duty of women. Women are expected to put the family's needs in front of their own, every day and every moment of their lives. Work done by women is taken for granted and not respected as 'real' work. Moreover, women and girls who aspire to do other work are discouraged and stopped. Men also are discouraged if they show interest in household chores and care work, with families and society fearing that they wouldn't be a 'real' man if they did so.

We can see in this story that Rohit has had all the support from his family without even realising. His sister used to make his breakfast, pack his lunch often at the cost of her own studies. His mother's health is deteriorating. She has issues with her back and has ignored her pain for far too long because of her children and husband. Rohit grows up feeling entitled to everything that his mother and sister do for him, until Kavita gets emotional and makes him question himself for his positive masculinity.

Men often express how they are essentialized as bread-winners and protectors in the familial spheres while women are relegated to roles of nurturers and care-givers. Men have their own apprehensions for going against assigned gender roles. These apprehensions are the by-products of social construction of masculinity which disallows men from participating equally in care-giving activities, thus perpetuating gendered division of labour. In story we see that Rohits friend's tease him, telling him he has started doing feminine work. But ultimately Rohit started 'caring' for his sister and her dreams. Taunts from his friends did not matter when he started caring for his mother and sister. Rohit transitioned for a boy who had to be cared for throughout the day, to someone who could care for the women in his family as well.

There are various socially constructed definitions of what it means to be a man. These definitions often discourage men from caring for others and contributing in domestic work. This is harmful for men and boys, as they grow up feeling entitled to being served and receiving care. This is harmful for women as all this work takes an emotional and physical toll. As men and boys start contributing to domestic work and care work, there can be important and healthy transformations within relationships and health within the family.
