





While Lata decides to leave the house and shift at her brother's place further also she joined the driving course. But is violence against women question what a relationship stands for?














































































































































































## Debriefing note:

Violence against women is one of the world's most egregious forms of discrimination and abuse of human rights. It takes place in every country in the world, across all strata of social and economic classes. women and girls still experience violence at a staggering and traumatic rate despite lot of efforts. This violence causes harm and misery to women, children, families, communities.

The United Nations defines violence against women as "any act of gender-based violence that results in, or is likely to result in, physical, sexual, or mental harm or suffering to women, including threats of such acts, coercion or arbitrary deprivation of liberty, whether occurring in public or in private life. Globally 1 in 3 women experience physical and/or sexual violence in their lifetime, mostly by an intimate partner. This is a stark reminder of the scale of gender inequality and discrimination against women. The vast majority of this violence is perpetrated by men, specifically against women and girls. While most men may never use or condone the use of violence, the simple fact is that men are overwhelmingly the perpetrators of gender-based violence. The root causes of gender-based violence can almost exclusively be narrowed down to two things; the fundamental condition of gender inequality for women, and the violent, harmful and controlling aspects of masculinities which are the result of patriarchal power imbalances.

In an attempt to feel powerful, men indulge in aggressive behavior, which is not necessarily limited to physical abuse, but can also be verbal and involve emotional manipulation. It is a power tussle that is deeply entrenched in patriarchy. Alcohol or any other substance abuse are just excuses. "Will a man under the influence of alcohol or drugs hit his boss or colleague or a stranger walking past him? No. Only his wife because he thinks she's a weak target.

We can learn from the "Violence matters" that The thing which we need to know and should be taught respect ourselves and learn to be happy, in whatever choices we make. It is okay if a girl doesn't like to cook or manage home. It is equally fine if a man doesn't want a settled career and pursue something else. The key is happiness and valuing oneself. It raises questions we all need answers to, collectively, as a society, what does it take to keep a family/relationship together? Just a silent acceptance of all that is unfair? And is it the responsibility of just the woman to do so? Within a marriage, what a husband says or does and how the wife perceives it is governed by their gendered upbringing. What is okay for a man to say or do is not okay for a woman or vice versa. This is gendered conditioning and governed by this, women are often told to take things in their stride and move on for the sake of the relationship. Do not hurt the dignity of another person in a relationship, every person has the right to life with dignity. As a society, we need to mobilise and collectively come together to address these deeply entrenched patriarchal norms. We need to include not just girls, but men, parents, in the conversation to deeply transform the norms that underpin these practice.
